Scott and Sarah were true voyageurs with small aluminum canoe and some pretty huge back packs. They crossed the boundary from West to East taking prevailing winds and the elevation difference into consideration. There is over a 600 ft. elevation change from the western source to the end at Lake Superior. It is a trip of approximately 370 miles in rain, snow, rain, snow, rain, snow and you're getting the picture. Scott says that the first 85 miles were the worst. It was the entry in the Rainy River and was 85 miles of the 'same thing.'

Apparently they crossed 40 bodies of water and had 21 miles of portages. The last portage to Lake Superior was 8.5 miles and appropriately called 'Grand Portage.'

They had 2 re-supply stations set up ahead of time, so they weren't totally out of civilization contact. The entire trip takes you through Voyageurs National Park.

It looked like a great adventure for a father and daughter. Talk about 'bonding.'

It made one appreciate the beauty in that part of the world, but grateful that we could sit in a warm room with a nice meal and enjoying someone else's

Adventure! Thanks to the Jorgensons for sharing it with us.
